Sermon Summary - John 13

Jesus demonstrated the ultimate act of humility and service at the Last Supper by washing the disciples' feet, including Judas, who would betray Him. He set an example for us—not just in washing feet, but in a lifestyle of sacrificial service. The true heart of the church is found not in status or recognition, but in selfless love and action. Serving others is an essential part of our faith, reflecting Jesus' character and drawing us closer to Him.

When we serve, we embody the gospel. Church is not about being spectators but participants—those who step up, get involved, and make a difference. The question we must ask ourselves is: What kind of church would we have if everyone served like me?
